


Shining a Light on Our Impact

Congratulations ... and Keep on Giving to Do Good in the World!

We near the end of the 2014-15 Rotary year. Through the end of May, the generous Rotarians of District 6900, have donated a total of \$990,976 to The Rotary Foundation:

- ♦ \$734,615 to the Annual Programs Fund
- ♦ **\$236,030** to PolioPlus
- ♦ \$20,330 to the Endowment Fund.

This puts us on pace for a record-setting year.

Your contributions to the Annual Programs Fund ensure the District's ability to support your various District and Global Grants. **Fifty percent** of the total donations to the Annual Programs Fund come back to us as District Designated Funds (DDF) and is divided equally between support for District and Global Grants.

By the end of this year Rotary year, we will have awarded over \$154,000 in District Grants to support various club projects. We have had four Global Grants approved and have five Global Grants pending review by the Foundation. We have had one individual successfully apply for and receive a Global Scholarship. And, we have donated \$20,000 in District Designated Funds (DDF) to PolioPlus which will become \$70,000 when matched with funds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the Rotary Foundation.

We now have **48** clubs that are over \$100 per capita in giving to the Annual Fund. Of these, **21** have given over \$200 per capita, and **6** are above \$300 per capita. **Thank You!**

BUT, The Year is Not Over. Support Your Foundation Now.

By the time you read this there will be only a few days left in the Rotary year. We still need your help to get your gifts to the Foundation. When the 26 clubs that have not yet met their 2014-15 goals send in those dollars we could be at over \$853,000 to the Annual Fund and over \$1.1 Million in Total Giving this year. So, please review the Monthly Contribution Report (MCR) to see where your clubs stands versus the goal that you set at the beginning of the year and take action to meet this goal, if necessary. Also check with the person that sends your club member's contributions to the Foundation to be certain that this is done before June 30. These are dollars that are needed in order to continue to fund our district grants, global grants, global scholarships, and disaster relief efforts at current levels.

THANK YOU! for all that you have done, for all you are doing and for all that you will do before June 30 to support the work of OUR Foundation.

Special Focus on Polio Efforts

Ray has highlighted District 6900's generous contributions to PolioPlus. Recently, RI Director Robert Hall announced that our Rotary Zone - Zone 34 - has exceeded \$1,000,000 in giving this year through April 12. As part of his comments, he said, "I would be remiss if I didn't thank two individual contributors in 6900 who have given a combined total just short of \$200,000. Thanks to DGE Bob Hagan and Atlanta Rotarian Wilton and Martha Looney."

In addition to the contributions from Rotarians around the world—and the generous match from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation - the eradication of polio depends on the hundreds of thousands of polio health workers around the world who help to reach every child. These workers are essential

to closing the immunization gap, particularly in the hardest-to-reach



communities around the world. Despite incredible challenges and risks, health workers continue to knock on doors, engage with families and community leaders, and raise awareness to ensure all children receive the

polio vaccine. It is their conviction and commitment that powers the eradication program.

Together, we can all help make a difference for the children of the world!

Amazing Overnight
Support for Nepal from

On Saturday evening at District Conference in Jekyll Island, DG

Alicia asked our conference attendees to consider helping our District raise the funds necessary to pay for the charges to ship a container of medical supplies to the people of Nepal. The supplies are provided by MAP International, Inc. based out of Brunswick, Georgia - and MAP's leader was one of our Saturday speakers.

The cost to ship the container is \$25,000. In less than 15 hours we had commitments totaling over \$30,000. This support came from individual Rotarians, companies and our Rotary clubs. Another mission made possible by you!



The summit concluded with a candlelight vigil at Centennial Park.

The World Summit: End Sexual Exploitation 2025 was held in May at the Carter Center in Atlanta with two days of panel discussions and reports from activists from throughout the world, including police, social welfare and business leaders.

"The most serious human rights violation on Earth is the abuse of women and girls," former President Jimmy Carter said at the summit. "This entire problem is a blight on the human race," Carter said.

Dave McCleary, director of America's Rotarians Against Child Slavery and a member of the Roswell Rotary Club, said, "The evil that is sex trafficking hit home for me personally a few years ago when I met a young woman trafficked out of my hometown of Roswell," he said. "This is a problem for all of us, in all communities, rich and poor, in all countries. But acting together, we seek to end the human trafficking that causes so much suffering among the innocent, usually very young women, any one of whom could be our daughter."

If anything came of the Carter Center summit, it is that progress is being made. The "Justice for Victims of Trafficking Act" is being debated in Congress. This law changes how prostitution laws are prosecuted, targeting the pimps and customers more than the women. Scandinavian countries have adopted what is called the "Nordic Model," which does similar legal revisions.

"We're just not going to tolerate demand anymore," said Linda Smith, of Shared Hope International.

Work is being done to train hotel staff to look out for signs of prostitution. More governments and criminal justice officials are working together to craft laws that punish providers and buyers rather than the victims, who can receive help getting their lives back together.

"It gives me hope we can do this and end this in the next few years," McCleary said.

Thomasville to host Rotary Fellowship's First US World Tennis Championship; Register This Month



The **Rotary Club of Thomasville** will host the 11th world championship tournament of the International Tennis Fellowship of Rotarians (ITFR) in August– the first ever in the United States. Thomasville Rotarian Gene McNease, an ITFR board member, is organizing this year's event, which will run from Aug. 23-31. It will wrap up in time to allow fellowship members to travel to New York City to watch the U.S. Open.

The ITFR conducts other tournaments but the

annual world tennis championship is the group's main event and draws up to 100 players and their guests. The weeklong event always includes side trips to take in local culture and attractions as well as ample occasions to socialize.

The Thomasville club is pulling out all stops. Upon learning that the championship will be coming to town, club member Joe Brown took it upon himself to recruit members to handle everything from guest transportation needs to social events and sponsorships. A smorgasbord of activities is planned. Tours will take visitors to local museums and show off the city's graceful old mansions on streets shaded by moss-draped live oaks. Plans also call for trips to Pebble Hill, a storied local plantation that was a hunting retreat for more than one president, and Wakulla Springs State Park over the nearby state line in the panhandle of Florida. Its spring feeds a lush river teeming with alligators and other wildlife and overgrown with the vines that Johnny Weissmuller swung on while filming the movie "Tarzan."

The tournament is always a fundraiser, and this year's event will benefit the Rotary Foundation and GRSP. Members will play at one of Thomasville's historic sites. Now 120 years old, Glen Arven was one of nation's first country clubs and, in the '30s, a stop on the fledging PGA tour. Landing the tournament is a plum for the southern Georgia city, population 18,718. Previous championships have been played in world-class cities such as Vienna, Barcelona, Montreal and Zagreb, Croatia.

The tournament will be open to Interactors and Rotaractors as well as fellowship members and their spouses. The categories include men's and ladies' singles and doubles for various ages as well as mixed doubles. To register and more information, go to www.itfr.org. The registration deadline is June 30.

AIDS Awareness and Human Trafficking: Making a Difference for Our Youth

As Rotary presidents and their boards for the 2015-1016 year scramble to get every leader in place to cover all the goals of the club for the year, we would like to issue a reminder for one of the most important opportunities every club in district 6900 has to influence and, ultimately, save lives of adolescents in your community. Be sure you have a representative for the AIDS Awareness/End Human Trafficking program.

This program has been revamped for this year to include the End Human Trafficking concept, as AIDS is often the outcome of the terrible trafficking activity. Your representative for this program simply contacts the schools your club sponsors, sets up the times of the programs, introduces the program at the schools, using a provided script. There is a county coordinator for every club who assists with the school and AID Atlanta scheduling process. This member of our district-level team will be contacting you for the name of your representative soon.

Each program costs about \$230, which includes an honorarium for the 2 speakers and their travel costs.

AID Atlanta provides the speakers who have had first hand experience with AIDS and Human Trafficking. The program will change the lives of many in the audience. What could be more important than that?

Midtown Atlanta Builds Apiary and Raised Garden Beds at Piedmont Park

In early May, a band of seven **Midtown Atlanta Rotary** volunteers erected the first ever bee house in Piedmont Park while another pair replaced some of the badly rotted raised beds in the adjacent Learning Garden.

Unable to bring a concrete truck into the park to create a pad for the apiary, our volunteers served as human cement mixers for sixty bags of concrete weighing 60 lbs. apiece. When they still faced a shortage of cement, Matt Hoots, the chief horse at Sawhorse, improvised by directing that they fill part of the space with large rocks from the adjoining streambed. Over the course of the day, our volunteers lifted 3,600 pounds of concrete mix and probably another 1,200-1400 pounds of rocks.

Diana Sauvigne' and Barbara Rose arrived on bicycles. Attired as any Vogue model would be for a workday, they gathered rocks for hours without a single speck of dirt managing to adhere to them.

Through value engineering, negotiating with vendors, and clever purchasing, Matt Hoots of Sawhorse sliced the initial cost estimate of over \$3,500 for materials and rental of tools to only \$1,638.43. He also made the event so much more fun by offering tips of the trade and explanations of what steps would come next.

There is never a dull moment in the park. Seven thousand walkers in support of lupus research strolled by and untold formations of U.S. Marines marched and chanted past our volunteers. Even the chairman of the Piedmont Conservancy and his wife visited for 15 minutes to offer their appreciation the work of Midtown Atlanta Rotary.





Teachers Honored in Special Luncheon

Getting Ready for 2015-16

As 2014-2015 students are returning home to spread the news about Georgia and its wonderful hospitality, host families, trustees and president elects are welcoming the students for 2015-2016. Although the numbers are not yet finalized, it looks like we will have a total of 46 students this coming year: 30 are female and 16 are male, which continues the trend of 2/3 of every class being female. In District 6900, we will have 21 students with 63% of our clubs participating. Meeting the family through Skype makes their family more comfortable and, who knows, you may make a lifelong friendship with an entire family! We had a wonderful class this year and we shed some tears when we put them on the plane for home. Now it's time to get ready for the next opportunity to meet the world.

What GRSP Means: From a Student's Perspective ...

If I had to choose a sentence to summarize my year in the US, the one that would probably define most of my experiences in this amazing country is: "it's just like in the movies." I have been watching American movies and TV shows for quite a while, so I knew that I would have a remarkable time here. I was not wrong about that. As I said to some of the host families and people I talked to, even some little things that might seem silly or not special at all to Americans and people who grew up around here, are totally amusing for me. All sorts of ball games, yellow school buses, traditional mailboxes with the little red flag, squirrels, deer, S'mores, Thanksgiving, snow (for the very first and lovely time), a pumpkin patch, shopping (and more shopping), Rotary meetings and other related activities, student weekends, trips around the US, and many other little and big exciting things... I do not think I could fit all the incredible things I have been living here in one single page, but I can certainly say I made the most out of my year.

One thing I could not forget to mention was how interesting it was to be in touch with different cultures, not only American but from all the countries represented by the other students in the program. Since I was the only Brazilian this year, I did not even have a choice not to get to know the other countries and costumes. With simple conversations, I could find out a lot of fascinating differences, but also many similarities. Seeing that we are more alike that we imagine made me realize that Peace really is possible, if only we are willing to make it happen. And sharing about my beloved country was also really nice, either by telling stories or cooking and authentic Brazilian meal to my host families.

Many people told me before I left Brazil: "Enjoy! It is going to be the best year of your life!." I knew it was going to be more than good, but I have to confess I was a little skeptical about that back then... How could a year away from home, without family and friends, all the people and things I know and I love so much, possibly be so great? Well, now I have the answer... First, being away from family and friend was indeed hard, but it made me realize how blessed I am to have all them supporting me in this adventure and in every single moment of my life. Technology made it easier and I did not spend a single day without hearing from them, but another factor also helped a lot. The song "Home", by Jack Johnson, can express the second answer. In one of the verses, he sings "Home is wherever we are, if there's love there too". I have to agree with him and thank Rotary and all the fantastic Host Families I had for making me feel at home, making me feel truly loved and appreciated every single time I've been to the meetings, parties, activities or just on my regular weekend visits to their houses.

I am fortunate enough to have Rotary in my life, officially, for almost eight years now. Once I heard a speech from a Rotaractor in which he said that when we live good things in Rotary and have great experiences because of them, it is like as if we were creating a certain debt. After we do that, he reminds us, we force ourselves to get up early in some occasions, serve the community and try to make our best efforts to Rotary in order to pay our debts. The "problem" is that when we do it, we always have a great time and a new and larger debt is created, and I totally agree with him. Before this year, my debt was already not the smaller one. Now, I'll have to spend my whole life continuing to serve Rotary and trying to pay this incredibly huge debt GRSP made me create with this astonishing year of my life.



Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest

At this year's District Conference, Daniel Hinton of Dunwoody High School received a \$1,000 "George A. Stewart, Jr. Character in Action Award" and read his winning essay. The award is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Dunwoody to honor George's dedication to student character education and the Laws of Life contest.

Some facts about the program:

- ♦ More than 45,230 students from 59 high schools wrote an essay for the 2014-2015 contest.
- The contest named 172 school-level student winners and 7 statewide student winners.
- Over \$20,000 in cash awards were distributed to students and teachers.
- ◆ The Georgia Laws of Life contest is the largest high school essay contest in North America.
- Nearly 495,000 Laws of Life essays have been written by Georgia high school students since 1999.


